

Good news for funding of local community projects!

With all the work happening around Magna Park, your Rugby Borough and Warwickshire County Councillors have persistently and now successfully lobbied GLP, the Magna Park management company, to include in their Community Projects Fund (LACPL) the villages in Warwickshire affected by their ongoing major developers.

The villages of Willey, Wibtoft, Monks Kirby and Pailton have now been included. At future liaison meetings, your councillors will continue to press for other villages affected by the Magna Park traffic flow to also be included in the scheme.

Applications can be made through their website www.lacp.co.uk/. The projects can range from £2,500 as a minimum, up to £175,000.

SAFE AND ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME

On the 8th October 2020 (Clean Air Day), Warwickshire County Council launched a brand new Safe and Active Travel programme. This is a free award scheme that is open to all primary schools.

The scheme aims to reduce the number of car journeys made to and from school - something which is an ongoing issue for schools, residents

and businesses. The award scheme encourages walking and cycling, promotes healthier lifestyles for children and their families, and aims to reduce carbon footprints therefore improving air quality. The Safe and Active Travel team have contacted all local primary schools in Rugby & Bulkington to encourage them to join the scheme.

Local councils on your side in fight against COVID

Since the pandemic began Warwickshire County Council and Rugby Borough Council have worked together to ensure residents and businesses have been protected as much as possible. A Shielding Hub was set up in just 8 days and mobile testing stations operated on a regular basis until a permanent testing station was established on Railway Terrace.

The existing working relationship between the councils made it easier to respond to the pandemic. Both councils were able to re-

deploy staff in the fight against COVID, businesses grants were paid out swiftly, and accurate data and information regarding the spread of the virus was relayed to the public. Also, every effort was made to maintain essential services including bin collections.

We still have a long way to go in the fight against the virus but the strong relationship and ongoing co-operation between both of our local councils has been key in supporting residents and businesses in Rugby.

Local issues across the area

County Councillor **Adrian Warwick** has concerns locally, as always around speeding traffic, and has been pro-active in getting Community Speedwatch organised in several areas.

Adrian, along with Borough Councillor Tony Gillias, is working with Warwickshire County Council to ensure the Pailton flood alleviation scheme is implemented. This will have be a huge benefit to the local residents who have suffered issues with flooding recently.

Adrian continues to attend the Magna Park liaison meetings and lobbies in these meetings to keep the Magna Park traffic out of the villages. Magna Park

now include clauses in their leases to state that traffic must use arterial routes, not the villages, which is great news for the affected villages.

The footpath from Pailton to Street Ashton is being repaired and upgraded, and this will benefit walkers from the surrounding villages. In Harborough Magna, Adrian also hopes to have a verge hardening scheme in place shortly, to bring parking to the fantastic new village hall.

Finally, after acting as Interim Chair, along with his Borough Council colleagues, Adrian was delighted to see Ansty Parish Council back under local control with its parishioners.

A message from Mark Pawsey MP

I want to thank everyone who has helped on the front-line since the start of the pandemic. Our incredible doctors, nurses and NHS staff have ensured that our hospitals and health services have remained open for business despite enormous pressure; our teachers and everyone working in our schools have gone above and beyond to make sure our young people continue to receive an excellent education; and our police officers, fire-fighters, supermarket workers, council staff and everyone in the charitable and voluntary sectors have done so much to support people and businesses through these most difficult of times.

Tragically many families have lost loved ones to the virus and we have all faced challenges at every level and had to make so many sacrifices. At various times this year families have been unable to see elderly relatives; people have been forced to close their businesses; and children have been unable to attend their schools.

I know that there have been severe consequences in our collective efforts to suppress and control the virus. Many businesses now face an uncertain future and, as a former small business owner myself, I know the pain and suffering that many local businesses have gone through. Although the government has provided an

unprecedented package of support for the business community it is a tragedy that not every job could be saved and that some businesses may find themselves unable to re-open their doors. I would encourage anyone facing an uncertain future to explore all avenues of personal and financial support that is available. We must look to 2021 as a year to recover and rebuild. The Government intends to pursue a policy of investment in both infrastructure and skills with the intention of fostering economic growth. This will build upon the 'levelling-up' strategy outlined within this year's Budget and the Finance Act. The Prime Minister has also been clear that there will not be a 'return to austerity' reminiscent of the economic response to the 2008 Financial Crisis.

The challenges ahead remain significant, but I know that local residents here in Rugby & Bulkington have the resolve and resilience to overcome whatever is thrown in our path. Whether you have supported a vulnerable neighbour, helped out in your local community or simply done the right thing to help control the spread of this disease, you have played an enormous part in helping us get through this difficult period in our history.


To help make this happen work on the town centre spatial strategy is now underway. Consultations are taking place in December and January with various stakeholders and members of the public and retail consultants Avison Young have been tasked to help shape the council's bold vision for the town centre.

Once the new strategy is in place it will provide a roadmap for the future of the town centre and allow the council to bid for regeneration funding. Everything will be looked at from architecture to road layout.

As Rugby Borough Council does not own the buildings in the town centre it must work closely with its partners, landlords and shop owners. This is an exciting journey for the town centre and will provide a blueprint for how it will evolve over the next few years.

A stronger & more effective Police Force to fight crime in Rugby

There are now 1040 police officers in Warwickshire which is a substantial increase from the 800 two years ago. There are now more officers in the 999 Response team and the Safer Neighbourhood Teams in Rugby. New teams have also been created to tackle Rural Crime and Vehicle Crime.

Following the outbreak of Covid 19 the Force have worked with the public in a proportionate way but have issued fines when necessary. Philip has also given extra funds to support victims'

organisations who help sufferers of abuse and those who have lost loved ones as result of road collisions.

Philip says: "If re-elected in May I will continue to support the fight against crime in all its forms and give the Force the tools and funds to do so. In addition, I will not forget my pledge to listen to residents, communities and businesses and address their concerns, so that together, we can all be, and feel, safer in Warwickshire".



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
